We also learn that she also at this time stands indicted before said court on no other charges - and that an attempt is making for the purpose of applying to Your Excellency to interpret the authority of the state to quash the proceedings or to grant a pardon.

This Ann Matthews stands noted in her neighborhood as one fo the very worst characters and is a terror to her neighbors - her conviction has we feel assured given satisfaction to those who know her best, and we respectfully ask your Excellency not to interfere, but to permit the law to have its just and proper course in the case of Ann Matthews.
